
For those of you who have never been to Fairbanks, I encourage you to come visit next Labor Day and enjoy the hospitality and camaraderie.

IBEW History

Member received pension check for \$131.96

In 1968, IBEW Business Manager Tom Hackett, and NECA Chapter Manager George Seaman, negotiated for electrical construction employers to contribute 35¢ an hour into a pension plan for IBEW Local 1547 members.

Not all members were happy about this at the time — many wanted to keep the money on their checks, and a vote was required. Julius Kornfeind, Ike Waldrop, and others lobbied extensively for the plan, and the membership voted it in.

Pattye Taylor (formerly Pattye Anderson) cut the first monthly pension check for \$131.96 in 1969 to Verne McCain, our first retiree. Today, the Trust pays out over \$13,000,000 a month in retirement benefits to over 5,200 retirees and beneficiaries.

As it turns out, the early leaders were visionaries, constructing a plan that has grown in 30 years to become one of the best in the country.
